Allotment Recipe

Beetroot Brownies

2-3 Medium size beetroot, cooked, peeled and chopped 60g Cocoa powder

3 Eggs 100g Self-raising flour (white or wholemeal) 1 tbsp. Olive oil 1 tsp ground cinnamon 75g Dark chocolate (chopped)

> 1tsp of bicarbonate of sode 100g chopped dates Cup of water

1. Pre-heat your oven to 180c

- 2. Grease or line a rectangular or square tin with greaseproof baking paper.
- 3. Mix the beetroot, eggs, cocoa powder, oil and dates in a bowl or a food mixer.
- Add the flour, cinnamon, bicarbonate of soda and blend until mixed well and combined.
- 5. Add water if needed, stir in the chocolate.
- 6. Add the mixture to the tin and spread out evenly.
- 7. Bake for approx. 20 mins until the mix has risen and firm/bouncy to touch.
- 8. Cut into portion sizes when cooled and serve with cream, ice cream or a healthier option of Greek / plain yoghurt.



Protecting your Allotment



Sadly, we are all too aware of vandalism and break-ins on the allotment sites. We take these incidents very seriously, even if we are not in a position to resolve the damage, so always report anti-social behaviour, vandalism and theft to the police, if they don't know about issues they can't deal with them. We also ask that you let us know by emailing <u>info@chiltondurham-tc.gov.uk</u> with the details, include the time frame in which it happened and the damage caused and include photographs if possible. If you ever see a crime taking place, report it to the police straight away by calling 101 or in an emergency 999.

Golden rules

- If your allotment site has a gate, always CLOSE or LOCK it when you arrive and leave.
- Be a good neighbour and look out for unfamiliar people around the allotment site.
- Get to know the other allotment holders.
- Do not keep expensive tools and power tools on site. If you do need to store them in your allotment shed, keep them out of sight. Make sure you keep an inventory of the equipment you keep in your shed, including serial numbers and take photographs.
 Security mark any equipment for identification purposes.

<u>Security tips</u>

- Replace the glass in your shed or cold frame with clear acrylic sheets (often known by the brand name Plexiglass). Acrylic is stronger and lighter than glass.
- Remove or cover material that could be tempting to a would-be firestarter, such as piles of dry branches, wood or clippings.
- Think about the security of your shed or tool store. If you have a flimsy lock, consider replacing it with a more substantial one attached to a robust mount or a hasp and staple fitting.
- Replace wood screws with carriage bolts which cannot be unscrewed.

That said, a thief who comes prepared may get through these so an alternative is not to lock your shed and avoid keeping anything of any value in it. That way, your shed is less likely to sustain any damage should you have an intruder.

Have you considered allotment insurance, it could give you more peace of mind.
